Impact Report 2018



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Introduction

This report outlines the positive impacts that Nottingham Trent Students' Union (NTSU) has made on the experiences of our members at Nottingham Trent University during the academic year 2017/18. It describes the services that we deliver and the scale on which they operate. It includes some case studies of the impact that these services have had on our members' lives and some of the developments in our service delivery this year. The document also describes some of our priorities for the next academic year, which reflect our strategic strands:

- A Confident Voice for our Members;
- An Inclusive Student Community;
- Accessible Opportunities and Entertainment.

A priority for the Union in the next academic year will be ensuring these aspirations are met through the launch of our extended and refurbished Union facilities at Clifton. This will create new social space within the Union offering opportunities for the growth of societies, representative training, information and advice and other student activities at the campus. The Union values the strong relationships that it enjoys with University staff and with University senior managers and academics in particular. These relationships benefit both our membership activities and our trading activities. However, most importantly they enable our elected officers and representatives to negotiate positive changes to our

members academic and broader student experiences.

NTSU remains in a strong position to continue to grow, develop and strengthen the representation and services we offer for our members next year. For the first time in many years, the Union will welcome an all-new elected officer team in July 2018, at the same time that it welcomes three new student trustees and a new University appointed trustee. The Union has further strengthened its induction programme to ensure they are properly equipped for their new roles. Our new officers will join a Union which strives to reflect good practice in all its operations and decision making. Their fresh perspectives will help keep NTSU dynamic, vibrant and reflective of our members needs and interests.

NTSU continues to be one of the leading students' unions in the UK. We ranked 6th in the 2017 National Student Survey which asks students to rate how well we represent their academic interests.

Our commitment to sustainability was recognised by NUS who awarded us their new look Green Impact accreditation for recent activity we have carried out including insight work and the removal of plastic straws from our venues.

Best Bar None

Our licensed venues have achieved Best Bar None accreditation in recognition of our responsible venue management and operation. NTSU staff have also completed Drinkaware training giving them the skills to better manage customer welfare and reduce risk of harm. Our involvement in these initiatives contributes to NTU's recently achieved Purple Flag status.

An inclusive student comunity

When and how did you get involved with NTSU?

At the start of this year I was a Freshers' Rep and towards the end of last year I set up a society for mature and non-traditional students.

What impact has all of that had on your experience at NTU?

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Achievements, changes and impacts

- Black History Month celebration with signature event featuring a showcase of cultural talent.
- Modified our Club of the Week award to include off-pitch activity. This allows clubs that are not in BUCS or do not necessarily compete every week to still have access to the funding this award provides.
- Lobbied the University to purchase a Race Runner Chair to allow greater inclusivity and more sporting opportunities to students with disabilities.
- Introduced termly Sports Council Meetings at the Brackenhurst Campus. This provides Brackenhurst students the opportunity to remain informed on updates from VP Sport regarding NTSU and NTU Sport.

A confident voice for our members

Information and Advice Service

NTSU's Information & Advice Service has shown a steady increase in its activity supporting students while at university. The key issues the service has provided advice on are accommodation, money, health and academic irregularities.

A student visited our Information & Advice Service (IAS) after having their studies failed and terminated by the University. IAS helped them submit their first appeal, called an R4R, but unfortunately this was rejected by the University, who said that their original decision still stood.

When we looked at the University's reasoning for this, it was clear that they had not taken into account the reasons that the IAS had presented in the students appeal. Most notably they hadn't reviewed the correct application. The IAS therefore helped the student submit the second appeal which, under the university's procedures is the last appeal that the student can submit. This too was rejected even though the IAS had highlighted again the student's grounds for appeal which had not been considered in the first appeal. When we read the reasoning behind the appeal panel's decision, it was again clear that they had failed to consider the facts that were presented to them or even acknowledge the R4R had reviewed the incorrect application originally.

The IAS therefore helped the student submit an appeal to an external body called the Office of the Independent Adjudicator (OIA) as there were no further appeals that the student could make within the University.

The OIA found that the University had failed to follow its own procedure as they had not considered all the information that was presented to them in both the first appeal (R4R) and also the second appeal. The OIA therefore told the University that they must look at the student's case again and consider all the facts.

18 months after the University originally failed and terminated this student's studies, the University have reversed their decision and the student has been allowed back to study at NTU and continue their course. They will continue in the year that they would have been in had their studies not been failed and terminated.

The student could have gone to a different University after their studies had been failed and terminated by NTU but this would have had a financial bearing on them as they would have had to pay for an additional year themselves.

So not only have we got this student back into University on their original course but we have saved them a year's funding of over £9000.

Representation developments

Officer team review

We have implemented a new team structure to provide more effective representation for students.

VP Services: role dissolved due to seasonal capacity

VP Postgraduate: a new role to represent our increasing PGT and PGR student demographic

VP Community: role changed to VP Community & Welfare to reflect the importance of Student Welfare.

Our governance document has been updated in line with best practice to support structural changes to the officer team and trustee board, resulting in more opportunities for students to get involved in our governance.

We have **improved our representation of NTIC students** through progression week, welcome events and marketing activity.

Our **VP Sport** gained the role of **Student Chair within the East Midlands** regional BUCS meetings, allowing direct feedback from NTU students to BUCS.





Academic Reps and Education

- Academic Reps now have their own widget on NOW, helping them to provide more effective representation to NTU students.
- Specialist software support. ADBE students now have 24/7 access to computers in Barnes Wallis and Physics students can now download vital software for free on their personal computers. This gives them greater opportunity for independent, flexible study.
- Library lockers have been installed in Boots library in response to student feedback.
- Increased study space. In response to student feedback over 100 new study spaces have been provided at City campus.
- Brackenhurst shadow bus. We have worked with NTU and NCT to provide a morning shadow bus to Brackenhurst campus, addressing a capacity issue with the regular bus service which caused some students to miss morning lectures.
- Graduation live stream tickets. The maximum number of live stream tickets available to students has been increased from 2 to 10 with no increase in price.
- **PG student loans**. Acting on student feedback provided through our Big Ideas scheme, the University has adjusted the tuition fee schedule for Postgraduate students to align with their loan payment dates.

Support & welfare

- Sexual health drop-in sessions are now available on the 3 main campuses.
- We created a pocket-sized **Wellbeing Guide** to help students manage issues relating to wellbeing and anxiety.
- A comprehensive program of activities to support students during the exam period was delivered through our **Stamp Out Stress** campaign.
- **Respect Ambassador** roles have been created within all of our main student groups; Sports Committees, Societies, Student Staff, Course/School Reps
- We contributed to the bid and appointment of 2 HEFCE funded officers for sexual violence and hate crime respectively.
- **3 successful resilience workshops** were delivered to over 200 students in conjunction with NTU and external provider, Grit.
- We took part in the **largest ever single study of student wellbeing** in the UK, with over 1,800 NTU students participating.



Accessible opportunities and entertainment

A joint event hosted by NTSU, the HIVE and the Sustainability team. Over 20 applicants took part in the Dragon's Den, with 7 prizes awarded to students, totalling £4k.

RAG Week

A successful series of events which saw us raise over £15,000 for charity.

Sweatshirt design competition

Organised a sweatshirt design competition for students which, following thousands of votes on social media, ended with one student having their design sold in the NTSU Shop.

Trent Talent showcase

Delivered Trent Talent, an event which allows Trent students to showcase their talent to a wider audience with a prize pool of £1,000.

Day trips

147 students travelled 2,598 miles with us to 13 daytrip destinations around the UK.



New opportunities

NTSU has introduced two new opportunities to enrich students' university experience:

NTSU Communities

An easier way for students to come together over common interests. Our first community facilitated an event in collaboration with the University regarding mental health awareness, leading to requests from other universities to work with them on similar events. A disabled students community which will be looking at inclusivity across services in the University and Students' Union is also in the pipeline.

We have also relaunched a new look volunteering program focusing on student-led projects and internal opportunities to create more value for students.

Give It A Go Week

A program of over 40 events to welcome January starters. This led to an increase in engagement with 410 student purchasing membership to societies within three weeks of the program.

Launch of **online training** for society committees.

Invested in **new kit for Trent Media societies**, including camera equipment and radio studio mixing desk. This should enable these societies to improve their production quality and capture more society and union events.




